

Osprey brings 36 years of backpack-making experience to the Raptor series, its first line of mountain bike hydration packs. To accommodate different torso lengths, three of the four Raptor models are available in two sizes. Intelligent features include a proprietary reservoir that incorporates a frame to keep the load stable and prevent the reservoir from rolling around when full or collapsing when drained. With vented foam on the back panel, as well as vented straps, the Raptor 10 is comfortable even with heavy loads, and hugs close to the body so it doesn't upset balance on technical trails. In this size, there's the usual assortment of pockets—including a soft-fabric pouch for shades—and enough room for tools, food and an extra layer. One of the most impressive features is LidLock, an elastic clip on the pack's front panel that passes through any vent on a non-full-face helmet to secure it to the pack. A few other features, like the magnetic keeper button for the bite valve, need further refinement. Overall, the Raptor is a strong first effort and should prove to be a durable pack. —Joe Lindsey





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
